INTERNSHIPS + FIELD EXPERIENCES

When a college or university requires, or provides, students with the option to do internships for academic credit, it must ensure that the experience is accessible.

"To ensure an equitable internship experience, discuss predicted possible barriers and creative problem-solving techniques with the deaf student."



EVENTS

Institutions must provide access to public events and ensure an equitable experience for deaf individuals. Review the various services and technology that can make commencement ceremonies accessible to deaf participants.
